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United at the Lord's Table, Entering the World for His Work



The closing ceremony of the 10th CCCOWE Congress featured three plenary messages alongside the Holy Communion, inviting all participants to receive the Lord's grace together. Rev. Dr. David Doong reminded participants that Holy Communion is not only a remembrance of the Lord, but also a sign of unity—demonstrating that all belong to the body of Christ as interdependent members.

The Holy Communion was officiated by Rev. Dr. Su Chii Ann and assisted by Rev. Dr. Caleb Soo, along with seven pastors and leaders from various sectors, symbolizing how individuals in Christ's body serve and build up one another according to their distinct gifts. The choir's music echoed the conference theme, conveying a shared vision of unity with one heart.

During the closing ceremony, Rev. Dr. Patrick Fung, Board Chairman of CCCOWE, announced that the 11th CCCOWE Congress will be held in Johor Bahru, Malaysia, co-hosted by the Singapore CCCOWE Committee and the West Malaysia CCCOWE Committee.



Walking with the Global Church to Build Missional Partnerships



Rev. Dr. Rick Warren, founder of Saddleback Church in California, shared via video message on the power of unity. He stated that no single individual, denomination, organization, or movement can fulfill the Great Commission alone. It requires the whole church, using every means, to preach the whole Gospel to all people, bringing glory to God.

1 Corinthians 12 reminds all churches to support and fit together in Christ. Unity does not mean organizational or institutional uniformity; rather, it is unity in mission—standing together in one purpose.

Dr. Warren highlighted five biblical truths about unity from the Gospel of John. First, unity among believers is the assurance of our salvation and proof that we are Christ's disciples. Second, the Trinity serves as our model for unity. Third, Jesus' final prayer was for Christians to live in unity.

Fourth, God gave us His glory so that we might be one. Fifth, unity among believers is the most compelling witness to non-believers.

He shared how Rev. Dr. Billy Graham invited global mission experts to a conference in Amsterdam in 2000 to discuss why the church had not yet fulfilled the Great Commission after 2000 years. Their conclusion: "Disunity is the greatest obstacle to fulfilling the Great Commission."

Finally, he expressed hope that this CCCOWE Congress would foster deeper collaboration, building Great Commission allies to organize roundtable discussions in every city, region, and nation—partnering with organizations, businesses, churches, and schools alike.

Courage, Faithfulness, and Trust: Living a Missional Life



Rev. Dr. John Wang pointed out through three real-life testimonies of Latin American mission partners that missions requires not only strategy, but also a courageous, faithful, and trusting heart before God.

Juan & his wife (Korean-Argentine missionaries): Founded a seminary on the Juarez border in Mexico to serve

migrants and deportees over many years. Despite high-crime environments, they courageously walk alongside local churches to practice holistic mission. Benjamín & his wife (Salvadoran missionaries): Relinquished superior opportunities to immigrate to Germany. Answering God's call, they learned German while pastoring both German and Latino congregations, faithfully

practicing diaspora missions.

Amy (Guatemalan missionary): Traveled to Mali, West Africa. Overcoming language barriers and political unrest, she persisted in staying to serve, witnessing through her life that those who trust in God will experience His provision and protection.

Walking Together in the Gospel, Witnessing Christ through Connectedness

Rev. Dr. David Doong, General Secretary of CCCOWE, encouraged participants not to put their hope in the conference, but to continue listening to and responding to God in their generation—allowing the Chinese church to connect not only for the gospel, but to become a living testimony of it.

He noted that the key reflection is not how many speaker messages were heard, but “what God is saying to us.” Future Chinese church ministry will involve more cross-regional and cross-organizational partnerships. However, the

foundation of collaboration cannot be built on resources, influence, or strategies; it must be grounded in the gospel.

Rev. Dr. Doong outlined the foundation of collaboration through four gospel dimensions. Creation: Every person is created in God’s image, possessing inherent dignity and mission. Fall: We must humbly acknowledge our limitations and courageously say, “I don’t know.” Redemption: We need God and each other; we freely receive grace and freely share it. New Creation: The church does not drive ministry out of anxiety, but walks together with

resilience in hope, because it is God who ultimately accomplishes the work.

Rev. Dr. Doong shared five self-reflection questions he often uses: What happened? How do I feel? Which story am I living in? How does the gospel challenge my story? How should I live within the gospel story? He encouraged everyone that although the conference is ending, true action has just begun. May the Chinese church continue walking together in the gospel, so the world may see Christ through our love for one another.

Returning to the Gospel Core, Responding to the Holistic Mission



Through plenary messages, XPLORE 360 workshops, and Affinity Groups, the 10th CCCOWE Congress addressed various topics around three primary themes. Though approaches and topics varied, the entire conference continuously revolved around one single core—the gospel. Everything was aimed at witnessing to Jesus Christ and responding to the Great Commission entrusted to us: “Make disciples of all nations.”

The conference gathered pastors, leaders, and believers from diverse denominational and theological backgrounds around the world to exchange life experiences, biblical interpretations, and ministry practices. While perspectives differed at times, these discussions prompted participants to step out of their comfort zones—expanding their horizons, renewing their minds, and pursuing holistic mission through dialogue, active listening, and the collision of ideas.

The conference consistently emphasized that the gospel must not be confined within the church walls. It must be lived out in communities, workplaces, digital spaces, families, and cross-cultural groups—addressing physical, mental, and spiritual needs to witness for Christ in every area of life. Though the conference has concluded and participants embark on their journeys home, the real beginning is putting the received messages into practice in daily life and ministry.

Echoing Rev. Tong Liu’s message referencing Jesus’ Transfiguration, every participant was reminded: The experience on the mountain (attending the conference) is meant for service down the mountain (engaging in the world). Churches and believers must return to the world with what they have received, continuing God’s work in their respective roles as lights shining in the darkness.
